Seed collection for large scale revegetation

Alicia recently attended a seed collection workshop by Seeding Victoria as part of the Bushbank program. This program aims to revegetate and protect 20,000ha of private land in Victoria. This ambitious target requires a LOT of seed, so these workshops are being offered to build capacity.



The workshop covered the basics of seed collection, cleaning and storage, and different types of fruits and seeds of Australian native species. We also touched on permits and safety, and where to look for further resources. In the afternoon, we headed into the field to put the learning into practice.

Natural Resources Trust Seedbank Revolving Fund

Normally seedbanks sell seed on consignment, but this new initiative allows seed collectors to be paid a portion of their fee up front when submitting seed to the bank! There is a list of eligible species for the Wimmera and Seeding Victoria has quotas for each one, so get in touch (info@seedbank.com.au) to check before collecting! A Biosecurity Strategy for Victoria

Agriculture Victoria has developed a Biosecurity Strategy following an in-depth consultation process. AgVic is the lead agency for biosecurity in Victoria but the strategy stresses the importance of collaboration across agencies, industries & landscapes for a strong biosecurity system, with a focus on community-led initiatives & Traditional Owner involvement.

Partnerships against Pests grants

A new round of grants was also announced in conjunction with the strategy to improve capacity in managing weeds and pest animals. The Partnerships Against Pests grants are open to community groups and Yarrilinks is planning to apply. If you have suggestions about a particular pest, weed, or other issue you'd like to see addressed, get in touch!

Council Roadside Weed and Pest Control Plan

Roadside weeds and pests are a huge issue in rural areas and our Shire, with its extensive road network, is no exception.

Yarriambiack Shire Council is currently preparing their 2023-26 Roadside Weeds and Pests Plan. The program seeks to manage invasive species across the shire effectively and proac-



tively. The scope of the program includes rabbits, weeds that are either prohibited, controlled or restricted, and excludes VicRoads managed roads.

Wimmera Representation on the Landcare Victoria Inc (LVI) Member's Council

LVI is the peak body for Landcare in Victoria and provides insurance cover, grant support, advocacy and training for the Landcare community. The organisation is governed by a volunteer Board, and Leanne Jackman of Northern Grampians Landcare Group represents the Wimmera on the LVI Board. The role of the Member's Council is to represent community Landcare, advising on policy and Landcare issues and facilitating communication between LVI and the community.

Project Updates

Landcare Priorities Survey

Last year Yarrilinks conducted a survey of Landcare priorities in our region to help inform the review of our strategic plan. A total of 54 responses were received (21 from a student survey at Warracknabeal Secondary College).

Wimmera CMA Soil Moisture Probe Network

This network of weather stations collects data on soil moisture, air temperature, Delta T, humidity, wind speed/ direction, rainfall and harvest fire danger index, and includes around 20 stations in the Yarriambiack region.

Farming is an expensive and high-risk enterprise. Accurate data from the network can be combined with climate forecasts and yield calculators to inform decision-making and reduce risk exposure.

This project was delivered through funding from the Australian Government's Future Drought Fund.

Weeding with Woodcroft College

Students from South Australia recently visited for their annual school camp in the Grampians. They had a full schedule of activities and spent some time with each og the Landcare Networks in the Wimmera—including Yarrilinks! A huge thanks to the Woodcroft College students and teachers!

Minyip Wetlands Wimmera Riceflower Site

The Minyip wetlands are home to the critically endangered Wimmera riceflower (Pimelea spinescens subsp. bubiflora). The students helped clear weed competition from around some transplanted seedlings, and removed an irrigation system that was installed to help the plants get established.



Grass weed competition is an ongoing issue so we are exploring some management/monitoring options with Minyip Landcare Group, Minyip Progress Association and DEECA.

Murtoa Trust for Nature Covenant Site

The students also visited a Trust for Nature property near Murtoa that has important remnant vegetation, however, encroaching weeds are an ongoing issue.

Many of the weeds at the site are large, spiky, or both, so we focused on mapping weeds that were too difficult or dangerous to remove so they can be tackled by a contractor. The main concern was boxthorn, but we also removed some boneseed. Saffron thistle was also noted in a few locations, along with Flinder's Wattle.

We also came across a brown snake! The students did a great job of staying calm and cool!


FrogID Week with Yarrilinks!

FrogID week happens in November each year and is a citizen science event that encourages people learn about frogs. The FrogID app, developed by the Australian Museum, is free, easy to use, and identifies frogs based on their calls.

Last November Yarrilinks gathered with some frog enthusiasts at Rupanyup for a twilight walk. There are about 13 species of frog found in the Wimmera (although some call at different times of the year) and we came across 4:

- Common eastern froglet (Crinia signifera)
- Eastern Banjo Frog (Limnodynastes dumerilii) (aka pobblebonk!)
- Peron's tree frog (Litoria peronii) (aka laughing tree frog/maniacal cackle frog!)
- Eastern sign bearing froglet (Crinia parinsignifera)

10th Annual Aussie Bird Count

The annual Aussie Bird Count is a national citizen science event organised by BirdLife Australia now in its 10th year. A small group of us gathered on a windy day at Lake Marma in October to submit some data using the Aussie Bird Count app. The app lets you record the number and species of all birds you see during a 20-minute window at a given location.

We started at the northern end of the lake near the pergola Alicia recorded the data on her mobile while the other volunteers helped look for birds. We then did a second count at the southern end of the lake.

Across both sites, we saw a total of 19 different species and 151 birds, with a few species observed at both sites. Although all the species we spotted were fairly common, we were really pleased to see that a majority were native birds.

Although we observed fewer total birds and fewer species at the southern site, a greater proportion were native species.

A big thank you to the bird counters who joined us! We hope to this again next year. What's your favorite bird watching spot in the Yarrilinks area? Let us know!

Upcoming Projects

In 2024 Yarrilinks will be supporting a project by Rupanyup Landcare Group to plant grass seeds at the Reservoir in autumn, along with infilling some trees that have died. We're also planning a mini plantout with Minyip Landcare Group this winter. 


Peron's Tree Frog

After our FrogID event, Adrian Tyler of Rupanyup took this picture of a Peron's tree frog (*Litoria peronii*). The species is distinguished by a thin dark line on the upper edge of the tympanum (eardrum), a vertical line through the pupil, and mottled yellow, orange and black markings in the groin and armpits. Although it's common in the Murray-Darling Basin, it was only first recorded in the Wimmera in 2015.

Australian Boobook

Taking good bird photos can be tricky. Mobile phone cameras aren't great at a distance, and birds are often quite, well, flighty! Ali Perris took this photo of a juvenile Australian boobook (Ninox boobook) along the Yarriambiack Creek at Kewell using a phone and binoculars. It takes take some practice to line the lenses





Tawny Frogmouth

Corinne Heintze sent in this photo of a pair of tawny frogmouths (*Podargus strigoides*) near Minyip! She commented on the range of noises they make—often sounding as if they have a head cold! Like the boobook, they are mainly nocturnal but can be active during the day.

Lace Monitor

Looks like this lace monitor (*Varanus varius*) was helping to enforce traffic rules! Thanks to Damon Bryce for sharing this photo. Lace monitors are the second largest monitor species in Australia and are adept climbers, as evidenced here! Their bite actually carries a mild venom but it is not normally dangerous to humans.
